

The Goal of Life: Guidance from Sri Sathya Sai Baba

In these troubled times, it is important to keep ourselves grounded in truths that direct our lives to positive thinking and living. Below are some excerpts from Sri Sathya Sai Baba's teachings, reminding us of the goal of life and the means to achieve it and peace in the present era.

Sathya Sai Baba, Prasanthi Nilayam, Discourse 16 March 2010

"All are the embodiments of God. So, the answer to the question, 'Where is God?' is, 'God is everywhere.'

The Spirit that is present in you in the form of consciousness is present in all. You cannot say that consciousness is here and not there; it is everywhere.

God is omnipresent. There is no need to search for God, who is present everywhere, in all, at all places. Therefore, it is very easy to know God. Try to understand that everything in the universe is permeated by God.

The objective of all your education is to experience God, who is present everywhere and in every being. To attain this ideal should be the goal of your life.

Close your eyes and contemplate on the form of God that you like. On whatever form of God you contemplate upon, God will manifest before you in that very form. Never think that God is somewhere at a distant place or that He is present only at one particular place and not at another. He is present everywhere and permeates every atom of the universe."

"Rendering Service selflessly with a compassionate heart Is alone true Service.

One is bound to attain peace If he serves in a friendly spirit. This is the truth; This is the truth.

"You have to recognise that life is meant for selfless service and not to be lived for selfish purposes. Only through such service can the oneness of mankind be experienced.

However eminent a person may be, he has to realise that the main purpose of life is to render dedicated service to one's fellow men.

Service should be rendered to those who are worse off than ourselves and who are neglected by the world.

It is the weak, the destitute and the helpless who need to be served. Even in rendering service to such persons, there should be no feeling that we are serving 'others'. We should feel that we are serving [God] who dwells in them.

'This is my duty. I am born to serve' -- it is with such an attitude that you should take up service.

All beings in creation are living by rendering mutual service and no one can be considered superior to another.

All service should be regarded as an offering to God and every opportunity to serve should be welcomed as a gift from God. When service is done in this spirit, it will lead in due course to self-realisation. It is this kind of selfless, spiritually oriented service that is needed today. To a world riddled with conflict and chaos, this will provide a climate of serene peace. Regard yourselves as brothers in a family. But do not stop there. Go beyond kinship to the unity of [Spirit].... Shed completely all selfishness and self-interest and enter upon service activities as the highest purpose of life. Service must become your life-breath. You must become ideal [selfless servants] and set an example to the world."

Inspired by Ryan Hreljac who dedicated his life to bringing clean drinking water to the villages of Africa, each year the Sathya Sai School students spend one month doing extra chores and making sacrifices to raise funds for Ryan's Well Foundation and for a project supporting children in need. 
Toronto Police Join Parent Parking Patrol

• Beliefs & Practice

The Five Pillars are the core beliefs:

- 1) Profession of faith: Shahada. This states "there is no god but Allah, and Muhammad is the messenger of Allah.
 - 2) Daily prayers
 - 3) Providing for the poor
 - 4) Fasting during Ramadan
 - 5) Pilgrimage to Mecca, the Hajj
- These are required for all believers.

• Contributions

Algebra was based on Hindu and Greek systems, but was progressed by Muslim mathematicians, who also developed exponents and balances, irrational and rational numbers. Al-Khwarizmi, the father of algebra, wrote "The Book of Reasoning and Balance."

Violins are the common ancestor of the rahab, an instrument that came from the Middle East and were revolutionary later in Europe. The modern musical scale originated from Islam. Muslim people often use music to get closer to God.

Toothbrush. One of the first uses of the toothbrush is dated back to the prophet Muhammad. He used a

twig from the Meswak tree, with soft bristles, to clean his teeth. The tree is known for medicinal and anti-bacterials properties.

Surgery and Hospitals are one of the most important contributions to society. Dr. Al Zahrawi published a book which became the source for many illustrated medical books. He produced about 400 different tools, including the forceps and dissolving cat gut for stitching during surgery. Hospitals were established for everyone who needed medical attention and there were no fees charged.

Coffee was first brewed in Yeman around a millenium ago. It was taken by Sufis to stay up during late nights of devotion. The delicacy drink spread to Cairo and then to Europe and Turkey, and from there around the world.

• Muslims in Canada

The number of Muslims living in Canada is about 1,053,945. Ontario has the most Muslims, about 200,000. Many metropolitan areas have a Muslim community. There are about 90 mosques in Canada. In the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, the wearing of hijabs is allowed in places of work and in



schools. Though Canada is generally a peaceful country, there have been hate incidents and killings of Muslims by non-Muslim Canadians.

• Current Events

Individuals and families have been targeted because of their Muslim faith.

Who are the Uyghurs and why is China being accused of genocide?

Xinjiang, in the far northwestern region of China, has large numbers of Uyghurs, Kazakhs and other mostly Muslim groups. The area is dominated by a vast desert in the centre of the region, mountain ranges and some oases in the South. The area is rich in natural resources and has some of China's largest oil deposits. The Communist Party took control in 1949 and has ruled with a heavy hand. Beijing has been condemned for its crackdown against the people in the region of Xinjiang.

• Famous People

Grand Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, leader of the Islamic Republic of Iran, leading 82.5 million Iranians. He verbalized the concept of "guardianship of the jurist," important to Islamic citizens who follow and respect the government the most.

Shaquille O'Neal pursued a career in the NBA and became one of the best players in the world.

Riz Ahmed, studied philosophy and politics at Oxford, then trained at London's Central School of Speech and Drama. He is known for his films, his acting and outstanding rapping.

Mr. Hasan Minhaj, host of the "Patriot Act with Hasan Minhaj."

Dr. Mehmet Oz, a cardiothoracic surgeon and host of the health and wellness TV series, "The Dr. Oz Show."

Mr. Riz Ahmed, a TV actor said, "It's really scary to be a Muslim right now, super scary."

Mr. Ramy Youssef, creator and star of "Ramy", a story about first generation Muslim American millennials and their struggles.

DJ Khalid, a Grammy award-winning music producer. "I love anybody that loves God." He is very proud to be a Muslim.

Kumail Nanjani, an actor and comedian, known for his role in Franklin & Bash.

Iman, a model, author, cosmetic entrepreneur, and actress and activist. She is not a practicing Muslim but considers herself a Muslim. She authored two books: "I am Iman" and "The Beauty of Colour."

Some other famous Islamic people are Ibn Arabi, Muhammad Ali Jinnah, Mustafa Atatürk, and Sir Muhammad Iqbal.

An important person for Islam was the human rights activist Malcolm X. He helped Black empowerment and the promotion of Islam within the Black community. He strongly disagreed with Martin Luther King Jr.'s opinions of peaceful protests and not defending themselves. Malcolm X condemned whites for the historical oppression of blacks. He argued for black power, black self-defense and black economic autonomy, and encouraged racial pride. On February 21, 1965, he was assassinated in New York City.

Another important figure in Islam was Muhammad Ali. He was a big hero not only in the Muslim community but also in the Black community. He was known as a hero to his people, because of his hard work and incredible courage. By motivating many people with his actions he proved to be more than a boxer. He staunchly opposed the Vietnam War and refused to become a soldier, even though it meant losing many of his boxing titles as a punishment.

Science Project Schedule 2021

Science projects were on hold for 2020-2021 due to the pandemic. This year, since most of our students are currently studying in-school, it was decided to reinstate the Science Project program.

Schedule of due dates for projects:

October 25: Last day for project titles to be brought in.

For approval, the teachers will decide their own dates.

November 29: All the boards to be brought in (any experiments for demonstration can be brought in, on the day that the student will present it).

Nov 29 – Dec 2: The projects are judged by teachers.

December 3: The best three from each of the Junior grades may be on display in a selected area.

December 6: Boards to be taken back home.









Tallying in SK

Students did in-class presentations highlighting how they made it and what they learnt from the activity.



Grade 4 Science

As a part of their learning on Habitats and communities, students explored the concept of adaptations by doing simple experiments in class. They observed the difference between toed feet and webbed feet by exploring how they work in water.

Regular feet/toes move easily through the water without resistance whereas the gloves connected with packaging tape on both sides gives the feel of resistance when you move the "feet" through the water to show how ducks and other webbed feet animals can swim more easily.

Students observed how waxy coating on the outside of leaves reduces water loss whereas it creates a protective barrier that stops feathers from becoming waterlogged.

Students also did research on endangered animals, how to protect them, and made creative presentations on the same.





Do not get disheartened by failure

Education should be utilized for developing the power of discrimination between right and wrong, good and evil. Without discrimination, a human being is worse than an animal.
